The yearly liability insurance is due and the members voted funds to pay this bill.

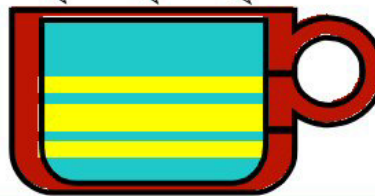
N4DOU then presented a Power Point slideshow about our 2009 Field Day activities. It was very well done and all present enjoyed it. Thanks to all who contributed.

Member of the Month

W4YLX - Rudolph Hatcher

Although he sits quietly at our meetings, W4YLX, Rudolph Hatcher is truly a Jack-Of-All-Trades. He was born and raised in Seneca, SC, where his father was a Baptist Minister. When his father came to Southside Baptist Church here in Florence, Rudolph moved with his family at age 19.

As a teenager he worked in a cotton mill and encountered Amateur Radio through another employee, a loom fixer, who had an impressive Ham Shack. Rudolph did not graduate from high school but was determined enough to receive that degree by correspondence and later took courses in Radio/TV at National Radio Institute (NRI) and at the same time studied for his Ham license which he got in 1952. He also received his First Class Radiotelephone Operator's License from the FCC.

Rudolph has a jinx. It seems that he can't be without a job for long because someone will always offer him something. When he arrived in Florence, he started working for Tommy Ayers, W4SZU, (See Note Below) in his Radio/TV shop. He branched out from there into radio and TV broadcasting and was the Station Engineer for several stations including WJMX radio and WBTW-TV. He also worked with Pee Dee Communications, a GE Two-Way Radio shop and for years he worked as a Professional Wedding Photographer.

Rudolph did not serve in the active military, however, he did serve in both the Army and Air National Guard. He attained the level of NCOIC in Communications before he retired after 26 years of service.

Rudolph learned to fly and took his solo flight on Christmas Day 1955. He became a member of Civil Air Patrol and was a pilot with the Florence Squadron for over 30 years. Although his license is still good, he does not have a current medical so he is no longer flying.

Rudolph loves building radios and started with HeathKits. When GE Mobile Radio came to Florence, he started working there as a technician so he could do what he loved and get paid for it. When Mobile left Florence, he transferred to GE Medical until he retired after 23 years in 1997.

After he retired, he took a truck driving course at Tri-County Tech in Anderson to get his Class A CDL driver's license. Over the years, he has driven both trucks and tour buses. He still keeps his hand in by driving school groups and teams to various events.

He remains an active member at the Florence Baptist Temple and has made five Mission Trips to Russia, Costa Rica and Peru. He has had a busy and varied life. He has lots of good stories to tell to anyone who will take the time to listen.

A little historical note

N4JJ, Jack Jackson remembered W4SZU, Tommy Ayers.

He was the Electronics Instructor at McClenaghan High School here in Florence during the fifties and sixties. A good many local teenagers received their calls through his class: WA4FTY, WA4FSM, WA4FHA, WA4GPU, etc. The class had an old Heathkit DX100 transmitter and military surplus receiver with dipole antennas on the roof. They used his personal call back then. He ran the TV shop on the side.
